1 Introduction to the St. Andrew's Church Finding Aid

A Presbyterian congregation was established at Bytown in 1828 and in the same year St. Andrew's Church was erected on its present site, purchased from Nicholas Sparks. Its first minister, the Rev. John Cruikshank, received a call in 1829 and, in 1831, ordained the first three elders to act as a Kirk Session, the body responsible for the spiritual side of church life in a Presbyterian church. The Temporal Committee was constituted in about 1833 to manage the business affairs of the church, and was incorporated in 1868. Then in 1890 the Glebe Trustees were also incorporated to administer the proceeds of a Crown grant which had been made to the church in 1837. Of the many voluntary organizations under the supervision of the Kirk Session which have been formed, and in many cases dissolved, over the years, only a few have left substantial traces in the form of archives. The present church was constructed in 1872.

In 1972 the Public Archives, now Library and Archives Canada (LAC), agreed to accept the records of the church on deposit. However, in 2015, St. Andrew's archives were transferred from LAC to the City of Ottawa Archives. St. Andrew's and the City of Ottawa Archives entered into a formal Deposit Agreement in 2016. Since then other church records have been added to the deposit at the City Archives.

This finding aid describes the St. Andrew's records held in fonds MG223 at the City of Ottawa Archives, which includes paper documents, microfilms, photographs and other items. St. Andrew's archival records also exist in other locations including:

- The 'archive cupboard' as the church itself.
- A digital (electronic) archive at the church.

- Microfilms of key documents such as Session minutes held at the Presbyterian Church Archives in Toronto.
- The National Library which has some publications related to St. Andrew's.

This introductory section of the Finding Aid continues with an overview of the St. Andrew's archival collection by 'series' or high level category of church records. The second section provides a brief history of St. Andrew's, an explanation of church government, and other general information about the church and its records. The third section of the finding aid has a summarized shelf list showing the contents of the boxes and also indicating which material is restricted.

1.1 KIRK SESSION RECORDS

The Kirk Session is the ruling body of St. Andrew's church and consists of members of the church who are ordained as 'Elders' as well as the minister. Kirk Session records include the following:

Kirk Session Minutes. These minutes are closed to researchers within the last 50 years.

The Elders' roll book (the members of Session).

Session correspondence.

Membership records. Included are the communion roll books, disjunction certificates, and wartime rolls of honour.

Church registers which include baptisms, marriages, and deaths/burials. Access to baptismal records within the last 100 years is restricted. Access to marriage and death/burial records within the last 75 years is restricted. For further details see the section on 'Restricted Boxes'.

Worship records which include a register of services, weekly orders of services, the baptism of Princess Margriet Francisca of the Netherlands, 1943-1944, and special anniversary services.

Searches for and calls to ministers.

Guest books which contain the signatures of visitors to St. Andrew's church.

Records of Kirk Session Committees: the Christian Education Committee, Music Committee, Policy and Planning Committee.

Subject files, which include records of the Sunday School, and church union in the 1920s.

1.2 TEMPORAL COMMITTEE RECORDS

The Temporal Committee manages the finances and operation of the church. Its records include:

Temporal Committee Minutes.

Financial records including general ledgers, financial statements, and pew rentals.

Property and building records including deeds, abstracts of titles, mortgages, building and maintenance projects, and the construction of St. Andrew's Tower in the 1980s.

Legal records including Acts concerning St. Andrew's and various rules, regulations and by-laws.

Church personnel records.

Temporal Committee correspondence.

Subject files such as pew rentals, a minister's apartment, and aid given to other churches.

1.3 GLEBE TRUSTEES RECORDS

The Glebe Trustees administer funds that originated from a 19th century crown grant of land to St. Andrew's, as well as other monies subsequently donated to the church. Their records include:

Financial records including property ledgers, cash books,; journals, financial statements, an insurance register, and blank bond forms, correspondence, and records of securities.

Legal records including an Act respecting St. Andrew's Church, 1890, and by-laws.

Correspondence.

Land records, which include a copy of the Crown grant to St. Andrew's of the glebe land, 1837, instructions to solicitors, and other papers relating to agreements, debentures, sales, mortgages, transfers, etc..

1.5 MINISTERS RECORDS

This series includes records created by or pertaining to the ministers of the church. There are sermons, photographs, newspaper clippings, correspondence, and other records related to most of the ministers of the church.

1.6 CHURCH INDIVIDUALS

Documents regarding members, staff, and other persons associated with St. Andrew's apart from the ministers and assistant ministers of the church. There is material relating to organist Carman H. Milligan, 1937-1963

1.7 MISCELLANEOUS RECORDS

Inventories of St. Andrew's Archives, 1894, 1931, 1948.

Historical records such as newspaper clippings, a scrapbook, historical articles, correspondence, etc.

Photographs. The photograph collection includes portraits of the Hon. Thomas Mackay (1792-1855), one of the founding elders of St. Andrew's in 1831, and of the church's fourth minister, the Rev. Dr. Alexander Spence and his wife, as well as of the Rev. Dr. A.W. Currie. Also included are photographs relating to St. Andrew's 150th anniversary celebration and other events of interest in the church's history. Many photographs were transferred to the National Photography Collection by LAC, with photocopies being retained in this collection.

Ottawa Presbyterial Minutes, 1936-1945.

Records related to outside organizations including Gracefield Camp, Ewart College, Knox College and the Presbyterian College.

Various records including the records of a Day Care Co-operative accommodated by St. Andrew's, 1972-1974.

1.8 PUBLICATIONS

Periodicals. The collection includes St. Andrew's Church Annual Reports; St. Andrew's Church Magazine; The Message, published by the Men's Association of St. Andrew's Church; and a church newsletter, St. Andrew's in Action.

2 Introduction to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Ottawa

2.1 The Development of St. Andrew's, 1828-1975.

A Presbyterian congregation was established in Bytown in 1828, and a church was erected the same year on a site purchased from Nicholas Sparks, the site still occupied today by St. Andrew's Church. The first minister, the Rev. John Cruikshank, received a call from the new congregation in 1829. Cruikshank set to work organizing the congregation and ordained three elders in 1831 to act as a Kirk Session. However, the Free Church controversy of 1843 in Scotland reached Canada the following year and resulted in the formation of a Free Church which drew off many of the St. Andrew's Congregation. This resulted in the formation of Knox Presbyterian Church.

In 1848 Dr. Alexander Spence took over as minister. Under Spence St. Andrew's began to expand not only as a congregation but in the community at large as various educational and philanthropic organizations were established. The creation of missions in outlying districts was undertaken and an assistant engaged in 1865 specifically to attend to them. The expansion of activities was reflected physically in the enlarging in 1855 of the original church building.

Spence was replaced in 1867 by the Rev. Daniel Miner Gordon. The expansion of Ottawa, now Canada's capital, inevitably affected his new charge. Development following 1867 was evident in the Sunday School, for a strong school was now attached to the church. Another school, established in Lower Town, continued to 1890 when it was absorbed by St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. Church expansion paralleled that of the church itself as St. Andrew's helped in the establishment of churches in

Hull (1873), New Edinburgh (1875), Rochesterville (1876), and Stewarton (beginning in 1878 with a Sunday School). Both the Ladies' Aid Society and the Women's Foreign Missionary Society were organized during the 1870's. The growth of the congregation again made the existing building insufficient. The old one was demolished in 1872 and a new one opened in 1874 under the aegis of a large committee appointed to co-operate with the Temporal Committee. It is this building which is in use today, although sections have subsequently been added. In 1874 St. Andrew's unanimously adopted the union of the four Presbyterian communions and became part of the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

Gordon was replaced by the Rev. W.T. Herridge, a man of considerable influence in Ottawa and the country as a whole. He was, in fact, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, 1914-15. The great esteem in which he was held attracted an ever widening circle of adherents, continuing the expansion of the church and the diversification of its organizations. The formation of the Church Institute and the Men's Association indicate that he was able to appeal to the men of the congregation

Herridge retired in 1919. The church continued its growth without him, buoyed on by the prosperity of the 1920s, until 1925 when it suffered its first real set-back. While union in 1875 had found virtually unanimous support at St. Andrew's, that of 1925 which resulted in the creation of the United Church was hotly contested. Arrangements for taking the vote included the preparation of a voters list, and the formation by the Kirk Session of a committee of six consisting of three elders representing each side. Of 803 persons on the list 699 cast ballots, 309 in favour and 389 opposed, with one spoiled vote. Following the decision, the minister, the Rev. George G.D. Kilpatrick, and 13 of 18 elders resigned. Over 200 members of the congregation left, but were soon replaced by anti-unionists from United churches. It took nearly two years for St. Andrew's to rebuild and to replace its minister, the Rev. W.H. Leathern being inducted in late 1926.

The church had barely recovered when, with the rest of the country, it was plunged into the depression, and drained of manpower by the Second World War. Not until the 1950s did it completely recover. In 1951 it hosted the 77th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. In 1949 new vestry offices were added to the church, and in 1963 an extensive renovation of the basement, to make St. Andrew's Hall, was completed.

In the 1980s, St. Andrew's engaged in a major redevelopment project which resulted in the demolition of the Sunday School hall at the rear of the church and the construction of the St. Andrew's Tower office building. A 75 year lease was signed giving the Government of Canada use of St. Andrew's land

for the office building in exchange for a one-time payment to the church. In 2014 the church called its first woman minster, the Rev. Dr. Karen Dimock.

Among prominent members of the congregation at various times in its history were: the Earl of Aberdeen, Governor-General from 1893-1908; Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General from 1935-40; William Lyon Mackenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada; and Sir Sandford Fleming, a well known engineer. In 1943 Princess Margriet Francisca, daughter of Crown Princess Juliana, in exile from the Netherlands, and Prince Bernhard, was christened in an historic service at St. Andrew's.

2.2 Church Government at St. Andrew's.

The organization of the Presbyterian Church is a hierarchy of courts, each with its duties and responsibilities. Elders, along with the ministers, make up the Kirk Session, Presbytery, Synod and the General Assembly. The work of the various courts of the church is described in the "Book of Forms" of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, available online.

The Kirk Session represents the level at which the every-day work of the Church is supervised. While the other three bodies are open courts to outside observers, Kirk Session is closed to all but its members. Session is today more a governing body than a 'court' hearing cases and rendering judgments under church law. Elders are elected by the congregation but must be admitted by the Session itself. The community served by the church is divided into districts, each one under an elder responsible for the spiritual life within it. The elder makes regular visits to homes in his or her district.

Kirk Session regulates the hours and forms of public worship; and provides for the administration of baptism and communion and the conduct of special services when necessary. All societies and associations in the congregation are under the Session's supervision and none can be sanctioned as congregational without its approval. In general, Kirk Session governs the spiritual life of the congregation. The first St. Andrew's Kirk Session was organized in 1831 with three elders.

While the Kirk Session is responsible for the spiritual side of church life, the Temporal Committee supervises the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. Its duties are also described in the Book of Forms. At St. Andrew's the Temporal Committee has been maintained through tradition, being virtually as old as the Kirk Session. The Committee was incorporated by a special act of the Ontario Legislature in March 1868, although it was founded about 35 years before. By the Act of Incorporation the Temporal Committee was constituted trustee of church lands with power to lease but

not to alienate or mortgage them. By another special act of the Ontario Legislature in 1874 it was given the power to sell or mortgage them.

On 3 April 1837 a Crown Grant (Clergy Reserve) was issued to the Rev. John Cruikshank and five members of the congregation covering all that part of Lot H Concession C, Township of Nepean, as was not required for canal purposes. The grant, containing 178 acres, was given in trust as a glebe for the ministers of St. Andrew's and the trustees were empowered to name their successors. A new deed to the glebe land, correcting the description, was issued in 1868 to the newly incorporated Temporal Committee as trustee. It administered the land from 1868 to 1890, when, by another act of the Ontario Legislature, the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, were incorporated to manage the glebe lands and administer the proceeds. At an annual meeting of the congregation in 1907 it was decided that the capitalized value of the lots, would be used for the maintenance of St. Andrew's and for assistance to various enterprises of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Although the Glebe lands have now all been sold, the Glebe Trustees still exist and share the financial responsibilities with the Temporal Committee. The Trustees hold and administer the funds resulting from the sale of the Glebe lands, and manage investments, bequests, etc. The Temporal Committee carries on with the day to day financial and temporal needs of the congregation.

2.3 Voluntary Organizations at St. Andrew's

Apart from the governing bodies the activities of the Church are carried on by various voluntary organizations, some enjoying a long tradition. Their rise and fall to some extent reflect the vitality of the church, and their appeal to the various groups within the congregation. For the sake of convenience these organizations are divided into a) mixed b) women's c) men's and d) youth groups.

2.3.1 Mixed groups (except youth)

A choir was first organized at St. Andrew's in 1855. It was not until 1874 that a pipe organ was installed. Various other musical organizations have been created within the congregation: the Mission Band (1893-ca. 1895); the Sunday School Orchestra, later the Orchestra (1893-ca. 1900); the Rays of Light Mission Band (ca. 1917-1948); the St. Andrew's Mission Band (1921); the Junior Girls' Choir (1948-ca. 1950); Girls and Boys choir (1963-4) the Handbell Choir (1970-); and the Junior Choir (1970-). Finally a Couple's Club was formed in 1969.

2.3.2 Women's Groups

The Ladies' Aid Society had its origins from the earliest days of the church. In the early 1840's a group of women operated as the Poor Relief and Tract Distribution Committee. In the depression winter of 1871-72 they operated a soup kitchen on Le Breton flats. The various enterprises undertaken by women were organized in 1873 under the Ladies' Aid Society. In 1876 the District Visitors were formed to collect money pledged by members of the congregation following the adoption of a schedule system of contributions. The Visitors grew out of the District Visiting Committee of the Ladies' Aid Society. Their functions were eventually broadened to include reporting to the minister cases of sickness or need for pastoral visits within their districts. The Visitors ceased to exist in 1909 and their functions again were taken over by the Ladies' Aid Society. In 1930 the Society's name was changed to the Women's Guild. Throughout the twentieth century the Guild has been responsible for raising funds for church projects and supplies, for war work, poor relief, and assistance to benevolent organizations.

In 1878 the women of the Presbyterian Church in Canada organized the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Immediately afterwards a Union Auxiliary, composed of women from all the Presbyterian churches, was organized in Ottawa. While the Women's Foreign Missionary Society supported not only foreign missionaries but also missionaries to the Canadian West, the expansion of the West led, in 1887, to the formation of the Women's Home Missionary Society of St. Andrew's Church, which, two years later, assumed the entire responsibility for the western missions. Being unaffiliated with any parent organization the W.H.M.S. was able to arrange its own work and allocate its own funds, which usually went to assist schools and missions, and contributed to the building of churches and the maintenance of missionaries' stipends. In 1909, however, the St. Andrew's H.M.S. was affiliated with a general W.H.M.S. of the Presbyterian Church.

The Union Auxiliary disbanded in 1893 and congregational societies were formed, including the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of St. Andrew's Church. Like all others it was affiliated to the national society and work was directed by the general society in Toronto. Its history, therefore, is closely linked to that of the parent organization.

In 1914 the Home and Foreign Missionary Societies amalgamated to form the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and the two St. Andrew's auxiliaries did likewise. All funds were henceforth funneled through the Presbyterial treasurer to the General Assembly for distribution. In 1925, following the Union controversy, a new constitution was adopted under which the Society co-operated with the Mission Board of the Church and reported directly to the General Assembly. Foreign work was designated Overseas Missions and home work National Missions.

Since their beginnings the missionary societies had met in the afternoons, but as more and more women found this inconvenient a second auxiliary was organized in 1926 at St. Andrew's under the name D.M. Gordon Auxiliary. It met in the evenings and like the St. Andrew's Auxiliary was affiliated to the general society. The D.M. Gordon Auxiliary ceased to function in 1960. In recent times the St. Andrew's Auxiliary was part of the Ottawa Presbyterial, which is part of the Montreal and Ottawa Synodical, which in turn reported to the Social Council in Toronto. The Women's Missionary Society of St. Andrew's Church was dissolved in 2018.

The Ready Circle of King's Daughters (1897-ca. 1907) was a society of women for Bible study and benevolent work. The Violet Mcclenaghan Group (1964-1970) was formed to handle catering needs in the church.

2.3.3 Men's Groups

In 1903 Rev. Herridge organized the Men's Association, the main function of which was to improve the finances of the congregation, although it was also to foster fellowship and aid in the church's work. The Association published The Message, a periodical which, for 25 years, kept the congregation informed of activities in the church. Its first editor was William Lyon Mackenzie King. The Association also undertook the distribution of a weekly leaflet at the Sunday services. In 1929 the Association was replaced by the Men's Auxiliary Board, which in 1934 became a new Men's Association. This organization ceased to exist in 1943 but was revived in the fall of 1950 as an informal gathering holding monthly meetings with the general aim of service to the church. A formal constitution was adopted in 1953 but the organization expired in 1958.

The Men's Missionary Committee (1909-1911), inspired by the Laymen's Missionary Movement, sought to awaken interest in missions among men and women in the congregation. It was composed of the elders and other men of the congregation. At the Committee's demise the men's missionary work was taken over by the Men's Association.

2.3.4 Youth Groups

Youth groups cover a wide range of groups and organizations from the babies of the Sunday School cradle roll to young adult groups.

The Sunday School is under the direction of the Kirk Session and has been given considerable attention and care throughout the history of the church. It was first established at St. Andrew's during the early 1830s. In 1877 a Sunday school was established at Stewarton, and this was taken over in 1890 by the Stewarton Mission Church. A Sunday School Hall was built in "the Glebe" in 1895 which was operated by St. Andrew's. In 1906 the Glebe Presbyterian church was opened. Between 1936 and 1945 St. Andrew's also supervised the operation of the St. Stephen's Sunday School in the west end of Ottawa.

Bible classes for young men, instituted in 1870 and later extended to young women, eventually came under the direction of the Sunday (or as it was then called, Sabbath) School. These ceased in 1882 but were replaced two years later by separate Congregational Bible Classes for men and women.

The expansion of the Sunday School forced the construction of a Sunday School hall which was opened in 1894. By 1905, however, worried about declining Sunday School attendance, the church instituted the Cradle Roll to register babies and those too young to attend Sunday School. According to the annual report of 1906, "Their names are enrolled and birthdays noted, the homes are visited, and the little ones and their parents made to feel that they belong to the Sunday School and enjoy its privileges" (p. 48). The Sunday School, from the late nineteenth through much of the early twentieth century, exercised a general supervision over most youth activities including cubs, scouts, guides and Canadian Girls in Training (C.G.I.T.). By the 1930's it also had some responsibility for the Young People's Society and the Adult Bible Class.

The Christian Education Committee (1968-) existed prior to 1968 as part of the Sunday School organization. In that year its sphere was expanded to include all Christian education work in the church and surrounding community. In 1973 it became the Worship and Nurture Committee responsible for matters of worship training, visitation and lay pastoral care of the congregation. In 1971 the Bible Discussion Group, Study Discussion Group, Women's Discussion Group and Open House Programme, an outreach programme for single adults, were all begun.

Between 1869 and 1871 a Young Men's Association operated for the "religious, intellectual and social improvement" of the young men of the congregation. A Young Men's Bible Class (1870-1872) was formed in conjunction with the Association, and took it over in 1871. Another Young Men's Association seems to have operated in 1874 only, and another in 1911. Young Men's Meetings were begun in 1877 to study religious questions but seem to have ended the same year.

The Church Institute was organized in 1887 with a membership of 125. The Institute, reflecting Herridge's theological concern, was to effect the religious, intellectual and moral improvement of the congregation. A few years later the Young People's Missionary Society (1891-1893) was instituted to "plant and foster a missionary spirit in the young and to train them in Christian work". In 1893 these two organizations were amalgamated to form the Young People's Society. The first in a long line, this Society lasted until 1899. Another Young People's Missionary Society was organized in 1902 to interest young people in the Home and Foreign Missions. Formed largely of Sunday School children and teachers, it became a new Young People's Society in 1909. In 1921 this Society, having long since become a female organization, affiliated with the Women's Missionary Society although remaining a separate entity. In 1923 the Young Men's Bible Class, long in existence under the Sunday School, organized into the Young Men's Club. However, following the Union vote of 1925 it continued to exist only as a Bible Class within the Sunday School.

The St. Andreans, founded in 1927, was a literary and debating society. It folded around 1933, and reappeared from 1945 to 1952 as a fellowship group for young people. The early St. Andreans had formed the St. Andrew's Church Badminton Club (1927-1933) to play in a city church league. The Minister's Bible Class was founded in 1927 in association with the St. Andreans and separate from the Sunday School organization. In 1934 it became the St. Andrew's Study Fellowship, filling the void left by the St. Andreans.

The following year the Young People's Society was transformed into the Young Women's Society or into the Junior Auxiliary to the Women's Missionary Society. The latter, which lasted until 1944 was designed to interest young people in the missions and to act as a feeder for the St. Andrew's and D.M. Gordon Auxiliaries. The Young Women's Society was also affiliated with the Women's Missionary Society, and in 1961 became the Business Women's Society.

Following the transformation of the old Young People's Society in 1935 a new one of mixed membership was formed in 1936 in association with the Presbyterian Young People's Association of Ontario. This survived until 1945, and the following year was reorganized and divided into Senior and Junior Young People's Societies. In 1951 the Senior Y.P.S. became the Iona Fellowship, or organization for young adults and married couples fashioned along the lines of the Iona Community in Scotland. The group disappeared around 1960 but was reconstituted in 1966 as an organization of young married couples, university students and young people in business.

The Margot Ferguson Group (1943-1950), the St. Margaret's Group (1946-1967), the St. Bride's Group (1948-1973), the St. Hilda's Group (1953-1954) when it amalgamated with the St. Bride's Group) were

all organizations of young women. The St. Bride's group at first shared and then in 1965 took over the supervision of the nursery.

The Disciples (1959, 1961, 1963) were a group of high school students who, in 1963, formed a new Young People's Society. This Y.P.S. was succeeded in 1969 by HERE organized to bring young people, 15 years and over, together. Junior High (1969) and After-Four Group (1970) were formed to attract children and young people from 6 years to 14.

The St. Andrew's Wolf Cub Pack was organized in 1915, again in 1919 and finally in 1928, when it survived until 1969. The Boy Scouts were founded at St. Andrew's in 1914 and folded around 1922. Another troop was attached to St. Andrew's in 1926, lasting until 1972 when it became a Venture troop which folded the following year. A Rover troop was established in 1930 and discontinued in 1941.

The St. Andrew's Corp of Girl Guides were formed in 1914 but disappeared within a few years. Another corps, organized in 1945, lasted until 1950. A Canadian Girls in Training (C.G.I.T.) group established in 1928 folded ten years later. All the cub and guide groups had their beginnings under the auspices of the Sunday School.

3 St. Andrew's Church Records

3.1 The Collection at the City of Ottawa Archives

In 1971 St. Andrew's Church, concerned for the safety of its records in view of a number of fires which had occurred in Ottawa area churches, requested the Public Archives of Canada, currently Library & Archives Canada (LAC), to receive the records of the church on deposit. In 1972 an agreement was reached between the Public Archives and the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's for the transfer of parish registers and the records of the Temporal Committee. The Parish registers were organized and microfilmed by LAC along with the Elders' Roll Book.

In 1973 a fire in the church's Sunday School hall revealed that other records were still vulnerable. A thorough search of the church turned up old records stored and forgotten in several places. It was agreed that the majority of these records should be placed with the others on deposit in the Public Archives.

The entire collection was organized in 1974. As the records were in a state of total chaos much effort was required to segregate them according to the church organizations which had created them. Inventories of records found in the church in 1894, 1931 and 1948 indicate to some extent what records have been lost over time.

In April, 2015, the St. Andrew's archival collection at Library & Archives Canada was transferred to the City of Ottawa Archives where it became fonds MG223. This material was indexed in the LAC finding aid 850 which was the initial basis for the present MG223 finding aid. In 2016, St. Andrew's entered into a formal Deposit Agreement with the City of Ottawa Archives for its fonds. In October, 2017, thirteen boxes of St. Andrew's documents held at the Presbyterian Church Archives in Toronto were sent to the City Archives and added to the fonds.

Some microfilm reels contain a mix of restricted and unrestricted content. For example, Reel 1 has an Elders Roll book which is not restricted, plus baptism, death and marriage registers which may or may not be restricted depending on date. The unfortunate implication is that the entire reel must be treated as restricted. Similarly, the other reels with restricted content, currently 2, 6 and 7, must also be treated as restricted in their entirety: it is not practical to give a researcher access to only the unrestricted portions of a given reel.

Kirk Session minutes within the last 50 years can only be accessed with written authorization from St. Andrew's Church, 82 Kent St., Ottawa.

Access rules for baptismal, death/burial and marriage records as defined by the Presbyterian Church in Canada are as follows:

Baptismal records less than 100 years old are restricted. An individual may request a copy of their own baptismal record, as can a parent of the individual if they are noted on the record. Next of kin, ie. spouse, common-law partner, parent, child or sibling, may request a copy of a deceased person's baptismal record. An authorized representative, ie. an estate trustee, an executor or administrator, a person with power of attorney, or a legal guardian, may also request a copy. Baptismal records more than 100 years old are on open access.

Marriage records less than 75 years old are restricted. Either bride or groom may request a copy of their marriage record. If either the bride or groom is deceased, then a parent, child or sibling of

either the bride or groom may request a copy. An authorized representative, ie. an estate trustee, an executor or administrator, a person with power of attorney, or a legal guardian, may also request a copy. Marriage records more than 75 years old are on open access.

Death/Burial records less than 75 years old are restricted. Next of kin, ie. spouse, common-law-partner, parent, child or sibling, may request a copy of an individual's death/burial record. An authorized representative, ie. an estate trustee, an executor or administrator, a person with power of attorney, or a legal guardian, may also request a copy. Death/burial records more than 75 years old are on open access.

3.2.2 KIRK SESSION RECORDS

3.2.2.1 Microfilm Reels

Most Kirk Session records are in paper form which are found in the table below by 'Box #'. However, Library & Archives Canada created a number of microfilm reels of key records which have been transferred to the City of Ottawa Archives. When the records listed here are found on a microfilm reel, the 'Box/Reel #' column shows 'Reel 1' for example, rather than a box number such as '233'.

Note that multiple copies of a given reel exist. Box 110 contains 'original' or 'master' copies of the microfilm reels which normally should not be accessed, and should only be used to create a new reel copy when a reel goes missing. Box 110 actually contains two copies of each of the seven existing reels for a total of 14 reels.

Box 111 contains 'duplicate' copies of the same reels, and it is the Box 111 reels that should normally be used for access. Box 111 also has two copies of most reels, but at present there is only one copy of Reel 6 in Box 111. It does not matter which copy of a given reel is used from Box 111 where two exist since they have the same contents.
