Minister's Reflection for Lent

The world has shifted... again. From the pandemic to the protests downtown and now to war in the Ukraine. The news unsettles, distresses and even angers me. Like many others, I sometimes feel helpless in the midst of it. I don't always know what to do or what to say but as we journey through Lent together this year, I do find myself profoundly moved by the Scriptures for this Season and the Love that they speak of, the Love that gives so generously of itself for the sake and well being of others.

One of the most meaningful images for me this Lent comes to us in Luke 13:31–35. Jesus, warned of the threat that King Herod is to his life, states his intention to persist in the healing and work he is called to do. He will not stop, he will instead continue to set people free from the powers that bind them and the illnesses that hold them back from life and life abundant. And as he says and does these things we hear him as well lamenting for the city of Jerusalem saying "how often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wing...".

I have in times of difficulty evoked this image of God as mother hen in my own prayer life. Closing my eyes, entering the darkness, feeling the wings of God coming down over me and drawing me up close to the beating heart of God... the nurture, the mothering love, the protection as God in Jesus comes between me and all that would threaten...

In these days the image of the mother hen, sheltering her precious chicks and facing down any threat that comes against them moves me to tears. She is both vulnerable and fierce in her defence of those she loves.

This is the love that we hunger for, that we pray for, for the people of Ukraine, for people

all around the world, for our own children and yes, for ourselves. The love that cares for us so deeply, that gives its life for us, the love that when it takes root in our lives inspires us to give of ourselves as well.

In this season of Lent I see this love in the image posted all over Facebook these days, of a platform in a train station where Polish Mothers have left strollers and buggies for Ukrainian Mothers fleeing for safety with their children.

Where do you see it? Where is it beckoning you?


Friends, the vision of the love of God upheld in the Scriptures, the voice of Jesus, they invite us to be a new creation. In this Lenten Season, the pain of our current day makes clear to us once how important the choice of discipleship is, of following Jesus and choosing the ways of his love. Fishing Tips

For three Thursdays in February and March, I invited members of the Kirk Session and Temporal Committee to join me in discussing this book that is written by the Rev. Dr. John Pentland. He is a United Church Minister in Calgary who has led his own church through a significant period of growth and discovery, nurturing curiosity and trying new things. Over a ten-year period, worship attendance increased from 80–100 people a week to 350–400 and the Sunday School from less than 10 a week to over 100. It's a great story and in

inviting the leaders to participate in reading it together our question became why not St. Andrew's?

The book itself is not a "how to manual". John Pentland shares his congregation's story not so that we can do exactly what they did but as an invitation to think and explore along new lines.



When those members of temporal and KS who attended were asked to name five great things about the discussion that the book afforded us they said the following:

- The brainstorming that it inspired and the ideas we came up with, it felt spontaneous and natural
- We like how an external voice and experience can help us see new possibilities ourselves
- The conversation was focussed on future and possibility
- Tt helped us visualize who we might become
- The participant size was small enough that we felt like we were in genuine conversation with each other and not just lining up to share opinions

Together we decided we would love to continue having conversations like this. It helps warm us up and get us ready for the revitalization exercise we will be embarking on as a congregation next fall.

I have ordered ten more copies of Fishing Tips to put in the church library and when they come, I will let you know. All I ask is that if you pick one up to read you let me know you have done so and if you are open to being part of a small group conversation about the journey it might inspire in us.

Introducing the St. Andrew's Anti-Discrimination and Inclusion Committee

I am a member of the St. Andrew's Anti-Discrimination and Inclusion Committee. The committee is composed of 10 voting members and one ex-officio member, who is our Minister. The committee is composed of a mix of elders and non-elders.

Our mandate is to effectively be the eyes, ears and voice of the congregation with respect to antidiscrimination and inclusion. We will act as the eyes of the congregation to ensure that no one is excluded from the congregation in terms of our communion and outward service. We will act as the ears of the congregation to encourage diverse voices and to listen both inside and outside the church on matters that concern anti-discrimination and inclusion. We will act as the voice of the congregation by teaching and advocating with the objective of ensuring that everyone is welcome at St. Andrew's. We meet monthly on the fourth Tuesday of the month. So far, we have held three very productive meetings. We have some big and exciting plans in store for you! Some ideas that we have been discussing include, but are not limited to, the participation of the ushers in promoting diversity and anti-discrimination, promoting greater diversity within the choir, and organizing pulpit exchanges and lunch and learn sessions. As for myself, I am starting to organize a roster of ministers who would be interested in speaking at St. Andrew's.

One matter of importance that comes up frequently in our discussions is that diversity should never be tokenized. For example, we need to be supporting, learning from and engaging with the Black community 365 days a year as opposed to just during Black History Month. The same goes for the LGBTQ community, indigenous persons and other marginalized groups.

I hope this summary gives you a satisfactory introduction to our committee.

p.s. I have included the recipe that was shared for families to make for our Ash Wednesday dinner together. Chili and cornbread. Please let me know how it turns out if you decide to make it.

Chili and cornbread recipe

Note: the ingredient list is for two peoples worth. Double or triple the recipe for your family's needs.

Chili Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1 package of ground meat of choice (please amend if vegetarian)
- 2 cans of beans of choice (make sure to rinse before putting in pot)
- 2 peppers diced
- 1 can of crushed or diced tomatoes
- 1 can of corn (rinse before using)
- 1 package of mushrooms diced
- 1 can of tomato sauce
- 🛊 3 tbsp of chili powder
- 2 tbsp of paprika
- 1 tbsp of garlic powder
- salt, pepper and chili flakes to taste (we do about 1 tsp of each)

Instructions:

- 1. Precook the ground meat, add to a large pot, crock pot or instant pot.
- 2. Add rest of ingredients pre-diced, and mix together.
- 3. If cooking on stove top allow to simmer for about 1 hour if you have time, less time works as well. Crockpot or instant pot follow cooking directions. Google online if unsure of time.

Cornbread Recipe-by Bless this Mess Please

Ingredients:

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup yellow cornmeal
- ^⁴ ^²/₃ cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- **†** 3½ teaspoons baking powder
- ¹√3 cup neutral oil or melted butter
- 1 large egg
- 1 cup milk

Instructions:

- 1. Grease a 9-inch round cake pan or cast-iron skillet well and set aside. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees.
- 2. In a medium mixing bowl, add the flour, cornmeal, sugar, salt and baking powder. Whisk to combine well.
- 3. Make a well in the center of your dry ingredients and add your oil or butter, milk and egg. Stir just until the mixture comes together and there are only a few lumps remaining.
- 4. Pour the batter into the prepared pan and bake for 20–25 minutes until the top is a deep golden brown and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.
- 5. Serve hot.
- 6. Bonus! You can also make these into muffins or double the recipe and toss it in a 9×13-inch baking pan. You'll just need to adjust the baking time if you are making muffins or doubling the batch. Muffins take around 15 minutes to bake and a doubled recipe takes 35–40 minutes to bake.

"Love the Lord God with all your passion and prayer and intelligence and energy.'


And here is the second: 'Love others as well as you love yourself." Mark 12:29-31 (The MSG)

Mission and Outreach

Update on the Arrival of the Mubikayi Family, our Sponsored Refugees

Due to positive Covid tests, the Mubikayis' arrival has been postponed, however we are confident they will be here soon. Karen, Bruno and I are ready and waiting to greet them at the airport with their winter coats, tuques and mitts. Masanka tells me that the weather in Uganda is currently a balmy 26 °C to 28°C, what a shock it will be for them to discover what it is like at -5°C or even -15°C and under a foot of snow or more!

Quarantine: We have a location ready where their generous welcome kits await them. Irene, Bruno and I will be in touch with them daily to check on their health and Covid symptoms, and to facilitate anything else they might need. With Lorna, Bruno and Laurentine, we are planning on filling the fridge and pantry with groceries and pre-cooked meals when the time comes. We have received a grocery gift card and more of these would be very gratefully received. When they are cleared to leave quarantine, we will need a house cleaning crew to clean the place and return it to how it was before.

Housing and Move: We are narrowing our focus on some apartment buildings in Centretown and Alta Vista neighbourhoods where there are ongoing vacancies. We are confident we can sign a lease at the right time. Now is the time to start planning for Move Day, when we will need a number of volunteers.

We will need (1) a strong outdoor team to pick up furniture and household items and deliver them to the apartment and (2) an indoor team to unpack boxes and organize things in the kitchen, bathroom and other parts of the apartment. We will also need someone comfortable with a step ladder to set up curtain rods and curtains for each room. We welcome high school students who want to help, and we'll sign for their volunteer hours. See the table below where you can help.

Household donations: Thank you for all your generous donations. Some items still needed are in the table below. Many household items are being held in a church school room at St. Andrew's, and that will be the main starting point to pick up items to deliver to the apartment. As such, if you have small items only, no larger than a grocery bag, you are welcome to bring them to St. Andrew's, and church staff will ensure they are put in storage. For larger items, please hang onto them until the move.

Important—If you are holding large items, please let Nathalie and Jeannette know as Nathalie is compiling a list of all pick-up items and places. This is also very helpful for auditing purposes—we have been asked to keep track of all items received in kind as part of our record-keeping for IRCC and PCC. (This list for our financial records will not be itemized, it will be a total value of all items received in kind).

Update from the Search Committee for the Director of Music

In December 2021, Kirk Session approved the formation and mandate for the Search Committee for a new Director of Music. The members of the committee are Frances Isaac, Rosaline Kalu, Jonathan Kim, Ian MacKay, Pauline Schneider and Kuawa Williams.

The committee constituted itself in early January after confirming membership and started its work reflecting on the history and strengths of the music ministry at St. Andrew's over the last 50 years. The committee celebrated the contributions and legacies of Carman Milligan, Anthony King and Tom Annand and the many volunteer singers, musicians, ringers, children and others who have supported music at St. Andrew's under their collective tutelage and direction and encouragement. We also noted the importance of music in worship over the course of the pandemic, beginning with Tom, the contributions of the choir soloists and other guests, and then latterly under the skillful and creative hand of Matthew Larkin and his effort to reconvene the choir under challenging conditions.

The committee then set to work thinking about the current and future needs of the music program and what leadership is required to carry music at St. Andrew's into the future. We acknowledged that like many churches and denominations, the pandemic and other forces have created opportunity and space to think about the future, priorities and possibilities. Indeed, the terms of reference from Kirk Session specifically asked the committee to

explore not only what St. Andrew's might consider as important but also to create dialogue with prospective candidates about what they might be able and called to create with us. To that end, the committee met to think about what a great music program might look and sound like without any parameters. That exercise concluded with the development of a draft work description, which outlines not only week-by-week duties but also room to explore musical programs and activities to encourage, grow and support the congregation in its worship, praise and service. The committee also acknowledged that St. Andrew's is blessed to be in a prominent location, has enviable work spaces, and important and significant instruments—all of which creates a firm foundation for the future for any new Director of Music and what they and the congregation might want to realize in music ministry.

A key thread that runs through the draft is that we want to balance weekly music activities with programs that put down roots to sustain music ministry for the future. Our hope, as we work to finalize the work description and application package, is that candidates will be inspired to offer their experience, training and skills in the context of a unique calling to St. Andrew's Church.

As for the schedule for the work of the committee, we expect to finalize the work description before the middle of March 2022, and then compile the application package, and decide on the scope of advertising within various professional circles. We expect all of this work will be complete by the end of

March. The plan will then be to give candidates until the end of April to submit applications. The committee will review and screen applications as they are received and if applicable, create a short list of the best candidates for in-person interviews in May 2022. If all goes well, we hope to have a final recommendation on the best candidate for the meeting of the Kirk Session in June. And again, if all goes well, negotiate a start date in September 2022.

In the meantime, the Committee will be busy as we continue to think about the future of the music ministry at St. Andrew's as we formulate questions and challenges for candidates. To that end, the committee welcomes input from the congregation at any point. Perhaps you have thoughts, reflections and ideas? If so, we want to hear from you. To make that input as practical as possible can we suggest that you consider the following questions about the past, present and future of music at St. Andrew's?

- Thinking about the music ministry at St. Andrew's over the past 50+ years, spanning the tenures of Tom Annand, Anthony King and Carman Milligan: name three events, features or moments that stand out for you as being particularly meaningful?
- Thinking about the current ministry of music over the course of the pandemic: describe three events, features or moments that stand out for you as being particularly meaningful?

Thinking about the future of music at St. Andrew's: describe three features, events or moments that might epitomize a successful and inspiring music program within the larger mission and vision of the congregation?

Let music draw together those who live as strangers


Bring joy to those we love, in thankfulness true.

Men's Fellowship

Our most recent Men's Fellowship Zoom meeting speaker in February was Dennis Burnside, a Senior Consultant with The Capital Hill Group. His presentation was an opportunity to hear an inside perspective surrounding constitutional and inherent First Nation rights, the nature of the "Nation-To-Nation" treaty relationships and the ways in which these rights and relationships are playing out in Canada. Recently he has been representing the Cowessess First Nation where 751 unmarked graves were discovered near the former residential school.

The next Men's Fellowship meeting speaker will be Tim Patterson who is member of our congregation and a Professor of Geology in the Department of Earth Sciences at Carleton University. The title of his presentation will be "In search of the Anthropocene: a scientific and political controversy". A new geologic epoch to be named the "Anthropocene" has been proposed to demarcate

the start point for when human activities became so pervasive that a tipping point was crossed, and these impacts are now forming a permanent part of the geologic record. The Anthropocene Working Group has controversially proposed that the initiation of widespread nuclear testing in the early 1950s, which also corresponds to the massive post-WWII impacts of the "Great Acceleration", be designated as the start point for the new epoch. Tim's research group is working to have the unique sedimentary record of annually deposited laminations draping the bottom of Crawford Lake, near Milton, Ontario,

designated as the type locality or "Golden Spike" for the new epoch. Crawford Lake is the leading candidate amongst 10 world-wide sites under consideration for this honor.

In April, we will once again offer a moderated group discussion coordinated by Jim Paulin on the topic: Why has our society become so polarized? The first discussion group in November studied the reasons for declining church attendance and membership, and how to respond to this challenge. We would invite anyone in the congregation who is interested in leading off the April meeting discussion with a short opinion item to contact Jim Paulin (paulinjim@gmail.com).

The Men's Fellowship group is looking forward to the time when we are able to meet face-to-face, share a meal and engage in a casual setting within St. Andrew's Hall to connect with each other. 
