In the midst of what might be an otherwise incredibly busy season I find this slows me down and redeems me. And when I say it redeems me what I mean is that it draws me away from other distractions that demand my time and try to claim my heart and soul and return me to the love of God.

Enjoying the light.

This is how the church begins the year. Lighting candles and reading Scriptures that remind us of God's promises and God's intentions for the world.

Sometimes if we are not careful, Advent can feel like a race. A counting off of days as we rush to Christmas which we think of as the main event itself. Christmas is important for sure. Taking time, paying attention to what it is we are doing, looking for the signs that assure us of their coming and preparing ourselves for life to change and all our relationships with it. In Advent much of what we are waiting for is mystery, and this kind of waiting... it fills me with wonder....

This too is what I mean when I say that I find Advent redeeming.

Light in the darkness, one candle at a time... Come let us walk in the Light of the Lord!

And may the gift of Advent fill you with wonder this year.

A Tribute for David B.

The Kirk Session at St. Andrew's has a tradition of honouring elders who have died by creating a memorial minute. This is a tribute written by another elder and is read aloud at a subsequent meeting. Sadly, this year, we have had five elders die. Even though our meetings are confidential, we would like to share these minutes with the whole congregation, as these people touched the lives of so many at St. Andrew's. For this edition of St. Andrew's in Action, we are including the tribute for David Brearley, who died August 29. This was written by his brother-in-law, Stuart M.

John David B.

John David B. was born and raised in Ottawa. After completing public and high school, he entered the federal public service and worked in nine federal departments spanning a period of thirty-two years. During this period he studied for and earned his Registered Industrial Accountants designation.

David was a dedicated and faithful member of St. Andrew's Church, having been a member of the congregation for over sixty years. He sang in the church choir for fifty-nine years (forty of them as the bass section leader). He served as an elder for twenty-five years and was diligent in both the pastoral care of the people in his district and in the deliberations of Kirk Session. He contributed significantly to the life of the congregation, serving a term as treasurer, serving as chair of the Glebe Trustees for many years, making crafts for the Scottish Tea and Bazaar and leading Wednesday evening study sessions.



David believed in giving back to his community outside the church and volunteered with several organizations after retiring including Carefor (formerly the VON) and Meals on Wheels where he served a term as

treasurer. After a year away he returned to the board as secretary, a position he held until his passing. David loved family, not only his family but also his extended family including his sister's family, and his relatives in Toronto and his wife's family in Scotland. He will be sorely missed by his family and all those who knew him.

White Gift Sunday–December 15, 2019

Mitten Tree: decorating the tree in Grant Hall with gifts for the Ottawa Mission and Bruce House (which supports families and individuals living with HIV/AIDS in Ottawa area.)

It provides disaster relief and ongoing support to communities in Haiti. A lunch and learn on their work will be presented after the December 15th worship service.

Centretown Emergency Food Centre: St. Andrew's provides ongoing support to the Centre through the year. Baskets for collection of food will be located in Grant Hall by the mitten tree and White Gift Sunday baskets during Advent.

Saturday November 30: Scottish Tea and Christmas Bazaar, 1–3 p.m. Thanks to everyone who donated basket items! Christmas Day, December 25th at 11 a.m.. Christmas morning service!


Presbyterians Read!

The word Advent originates from the Latin word adventus, which means "coming." During this season, we pause and look back at Christ's coming into the world as a baby and we anticipate his coming again. We are invited to celebrate the unique in-between space of "already but not yet." It is a space filled with the extravagant grace of God, and Advent is a time of learning to trust and live in this gift of grace.

Presbyterians Read: Celebrating Abundance

In Advent 2019, Presbyterians across the country are invited to join a denomination-wide book study on Walter Brueggemann's *Celebrating Abundance*. Using thoughtfully prepared small group and

prepared small group and individual weekly study guides, Presbyterians will journey through Advent reflecting on themes of God's abundance as revealed through the small details of faith stories—a cry in the wilderness, a teenage mother, a worn down stable and a promise of a new day.



Celebrating Abundance was chosen as a denomination-wide book study for this season because each of Brueggemann's daily reflections in this book are an invitation to see beyond the illusions of worldly extravagance and to embrace the true abundance readily available through Christ. In a world where fear and anxiety abound, Brueggemann calls us to believe in the in-breaking of the kingdom of God through Christ, who brings hope, joy, love and peace. Brueggemann's words, which are steeped in God's love and care for us, inspire us to "do kingdom things we did not think we had in us".

Ways to get involved

- Solo—Get a copy of Celebrating Abundance and read the devotions each day;
- 2. Small Group—Start or join a small group of people reading the daily devotions on their own but meeting to discuss what they've read once a week; speak to Reverend Dimock if this interests you and we will organize a group to do this;
- 3. Online in our Facebook Group—Read the devotions each day and join the

discussion with other Presbyterians in our Facebook study group. All are welcome to join. The group is private and only the members in the group can see who's in the group and what they post. Through ecumenical friendships, The Open Table provides young adults and students in the University of Ottawa area with a place to gather

Healing & Reconciliation Trip, June 15–26, 2019

This past June I was a part of a team of about 35 Presbyterians from congregations across Canada to go on a Healing and Reconciliation journey/tour for 10 days throughout northern Ontario and the Prairies. This picture you see was taken in Kenora, Ontario which is about 4 hours away from Winnipeg. Visiting these communities, hearing them so openly share their stories was not only life-changing but eye-opening. Our Indigenous brothers and sisters welcomed us so warmly into their lives to share their stories as residential school survivors and the intergenerational effects on their families with everyone. These people and their stories



matter. When people ask me about my trip and ask "how was it?" all I can respond with is "interesting." It was such an interesting but challenging experience hearing the horrors of residential schools and seeing the conditions many continue to live through daily. The amount of substance abuse was heartwrenching, the pain and sorrow these people have endured at the hand of Canadians "who

had no idea residential schools were happening." The last residential school closed in 1998, which is within my life time... That I had not heard of residential schools till my first year of university is mind-blogging. I say this not to point fingers but rather to encourage us to learn from past mistakes and go forward

united realizing that the horrors of the past will not be forgotten but will slowly begin to heal the more effort we put into reconciliation work. If you are interested in learning more about my journey please reach out and I would be happy to share the stories I have heard with you. We can make a difference.

Kenora Fellowship Centre

On Sunday, October 20, 2019, I joined Rod and Beulah at Westminster Church to make a presentation on our Truth and Reconciliation Mission Trip that we went on this past June.

I spoke about the Kenora Fellowship Centre. I noted that according to the most recent Census, indigenous people comprise 19% of the population of Kenora, but that it is pretty clear when you take a walk through town, that at least 90% of homeless people are indigenous. There is a very serious and chronic lack of affordable housing in Kenora. As a result, although the Centre is intended to provide temporary housing, many of its residents must use it on a long term basis.

I discussed some of the outreach activities in which our group participated. These included preparing a fish fry lunch and breakfast buffet. I also assisted with some basic clean up tasks such as wiping down tables, chairs and mopping floors. While I was wiping down some chairs, I started to think of how during one of our St. Andrew's AGM's, we spent a relatively lengthy period discussing how our current supply of chairs were not comfortable, that we desperately needed new ones and how much that would cost. My time spent at Kenora Fellowship Centre definitely put things into a new perspective. The Centre is in need of some very basic yet essential repairs...which makes our St. Andrew's debate about chairs seem rather minor in comparison.

The Centre faces many challenges, which include a shortage of staffing, insufficient funding and some racist attitudes in the city of Kenora. Following my talk, I met a member of the Westminster congregation who lived in Kenora for ten years. She explained to me that there is great divide of views on indigenous people among the city's residents. Some residents are very progressive and supportive of indigenous rights while others have flagrantly racist attitudes.

My talk received a rapturous response from the Westminster congregation. I spent at least an hour following the service discussing next steps with members of the congregation. They are so enthusiastic. They even talked about driving up to Kenora themselves to not only donate winter clothes, but to assist with some DIY yourself repairs at the Centre!

Last week Rob and Rod, the committee convenors, packaged up the donations given to support the people at the Kenora Fellowship Centre. They filled 6 large construction size bags and 6 large garbage

bags with the following items: 30 backpacks; 12–14 heavy blankets; 20 warm coats; 25 sweaters; 200 pairs of socks; 100 pairs of mitts and gloves; 50 hats or toques; 30 scarves; 25 pairs of boots; 8 pairs of pants and several lighter shirts. The team is overwhelmed with the support of the congregation for this cause. It will all be well used when it arrives. It is scheduled to leave Friday Nov. 29. Thanks again to everyone who contributed and helped out! The puppet was called this so the kids could remember their bible verse of the week better, Ephesians 3:20. The bible stories engaged the children, we focused on Daniel and the lion's den, the Good Samaritan, Esther and more.

The mission project chosen this year was the Winnipeg Intercity Mission which myself and Rev. Karen visited on the Healing and Reconciliation Trip. This organization is supported by the Presbyterian Church of Canada and volunteers drive in the organization's van to pick up the families around the rough neighbourhood of North

Winnipeg to bring them to church. The families have no other way to get there and few resources. The church supplies teaching resources on parenting, addiction counselling, childcare and a free meal every Sunday at church for a congregation of about 80 people. They drive them to church and home filling up cars that are run down and in need of replacing. This year the kids raised \$87 to donate towards a new van for the Winnipeg Intercity Mission—they loved raising the money for it and thought that what the organization was doing was so cool!

Overall I believe VBS was a success as the kids had fun and learned about the Lord. It was encouraging to watch them dance to the songs and say the bible verse by themselves at the end of the week. I am happy that I was able to direct "Mars & Beyond" this year, thank you again to everyone who made it possible!

Marco Depestre Foundation Update

While 2019 has so far brought reasons to rejoice, the Marco Depestre Foundation, like most organizations serving in Haiti, have experienced great concern with the mounting insecurity, political unrest and disturbances that have caused us to curtail or suspend our activities. Travelling in and outside of the capital Port-au-Prince is hindered by road blocks. I am thankful that though it was a challenge, during my onsite visit to Haiti from August 21 to September 11, apart from a visit to Macary (South-eastern Haiti), I had the opportunity to meet with the beneficiaries of the different projects funded by us and carried out by the Foundation in Haiti (MDFH).

Our ongoing Child Sponsorship Project now provides scholarships to forty-three children. Our church family at St. Andrew's sponsors a total of 11 children ranging from Kindergarten to the equivalent of Grade 10! In general, all the children are healthy and growing, with average grades. One of them graduated from High School this year and plans to pursue studies in accountancy.

With generous donations received, we distributed school supplies in Laboule 12. I was unable to distribute the school supplies destined for La Saline as the school was unable to function at that time; a small amount was given to the School Principals in Savana, Furcy and Fondoux to be distributed to the neediest children. Students and guardians received with gratitude these necessary items. Close to 200 Kindergarten and Grade School students received notebooks, pens, pencils, sharpeners, geometry sets, rulers, colouring books and educational toys.

Six needy student families benefit from our Nutrition Supplement Program. A monthly voucher of \$25US is provided for beneficiaries to purchase nutritious food that provides the children a unique

experience to eagerly shop at a grocery store. As a result, their health, stamina and school performance have improved or remained stable.

In the Fondoux, funds raised by the VBS children last year were used to start a small school garden. Though some cleaning of the space was needed, tomato, eggplant and papaya trees were growing when I passed by on September 7. In our Goat Project, three goats were given to replace those who had died for diverse reasons. The first kids will be passed on to other families when they are strong enough. Additional kids will be kept by the family to provide sustenance and livelihood.

As part of our long term Agroforestry Project to reinforce the land and provide a source of revenue for families in the designated areas, I was able to visit the nursery sites in Vialet/Barette on September 2 for the distribution of 2,567 seedlings of mango, cocoa, nut, cedar, tamaris, acacia cherry as well as others. On September 9, I participated in the distribution of 1,233 seedlings of nut, oak, ash, tamaris and passiflo in Furcy.

In both places a number of men and women helped to fill the bags with soil, while someone on site would do the watering. When the situation permits, follow up visits by the Agricultural Agent will be carried out at the locations where trees have been planted to interview beneficiaries and to take photographs.

In a remote region in the South, the Savana School community does not have latrines. To improve the health risks six latrines for families closest to the school are being completed with funds from our Humanitarian Aid Project.

In October, we responded to a dire request and offered dry goods to 200 plus families in Laboule 12, who had no means to survive since they were unable to work because of the disturbances. Provisions to the grateful families included rice, beans, tomato paste, milk, spaghetti and oil.

A significant change in the operation of the Marco Depestre Foundation in Haiti occurred last September, when the President, Rev. Marco Depestre Jr accepted a call to minister at a Methodist Church in New Jersey for a year. He was replaced by the Vice-President, Mr Rosny Desroches. As a result, the Foundation had to open its first one room office, to maintain the records that were previously housed at Marco's home.

The situation is far from settled in the country but we are most thankful to have been able to reach out during dire times. On behalf of the Foundation, I would like to thank our minister, Rev. Dr. Karen Dimock, the Mission & Outreach Ministry and the many members of the congregation for their continued vital support of the mission and work of the foundation.

May the Lord bless the congregation of St. Andrew's for their generosity and support!

Church School: Helping Our Children Grow in Faith

The teachers were: Sana W., Barbara and Scott W., Lorna E., Dana G., Melanie T., Elinor H. and Family, Stacey H., Joshua L. and Family, Koko A. and Family, Sydney and Tim M., and Althea and Clark G. We had from 6 to 16 children in the class

throughout the summer. Each summer, we invite volunteers (families and individuals) to teach a class. It is a wonderful opportunity for those in the congregation who normally do not teach church school to do so one Sunday (or more) during the summer.

In September, the new Church School year started out with a wonderful Rally Sunday that included blessing of the back packs, the commissioning of the teachers, and registration of children. We have 43 children registered for church school. "Thank You" to all the parents and guardians for completing the registration form for their children and youth each year, as it helps us to safeguard the health and safety of the children.

This year, we welcome Koko A. as Co-Superintendent of Church School with me. Koko has brought to the position her experience in teaching church school and leading other Christian education activities at St. Andrew's, along with lots of energy and ideas.

Thank you to all our volunteers who are giving of their time and talent to help our children learn and grow in faith! At the 9:15 a.m. services, we welcome back Afua O. who coteaches with Sydney M. For the 11:00 a.m. services, we welcome Tim M. as a new teacher for the ages 10–11 class along with Jide A. And, we welcome back Joshua L. and Sana W. teaching the ages 2–5 class, Elinor H. and Lorna E. teaching the ages 6–7 class, Stacey H. teaching the ages 8–9 class, and Aisling B. leading the youth class (ages 12 and up).

We have started using a new curriculum called 'Spark' for the ages 6 to 11 children, after using the Season curriculum for many years. We selected Spark following a focused search in the spring for a change in teaching material that reflects the needs of our children. We carefully considered several curriculum criteria, including: focuses on God and salvation as a gift of faith; provides opportunity for depth of

learning as children age and a broad span of Old and New Testaments stories reflecting the themes of Creation, Fall, Restoration, and Redemption; reflects diversity of children and society; invites reflection and questioning as key components of learning and understanding; calls for children to live out what they are learning about God at church, at home and in their communities; and, is fun. If you would like to know more about the Spark curriculum or about the criteria used to guide our selection, please contact me, Koko or Sydney.

In addition, Koko and I are continuing to ensure that growing in faith is also derived through singing, particularly some oldies but goodies that children continue to sing and hum long after they leave the church each Sunday. We continue to sing last year's songs—Hallelu, Hallelu, Hallelu, Hallelujah and I've Got the Joy Joy Joy Joy and are focussing on two new catchy songs—Noah—Arky Arky Arky and My Cup is Full and Running Over, along with other seasonal songs.

We are also introducing a new activity during Assembly time in Grant Hall. As the children are taught the importance of seeking spiritual guidance from our Minister, their parents and guardians, and Elders, we will invite Elders to attend the Assembly Time in Grant Hall from time to time to speak with the children about who they are and their role in the church.
